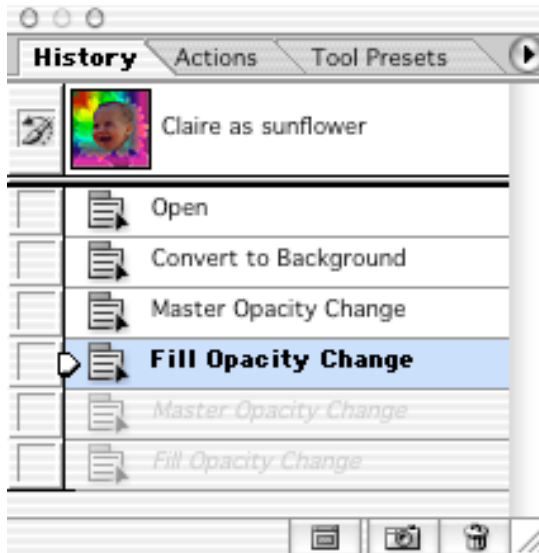


Adobe Photoshop 7 Default Palettes

Access any Palette by going to the Window Menu and selecting the Palette name. The four below are Default Palettes. If they don't appear when Photoshop is launched, go to Window/Workspace/Reset Palette Locations. Move a Palette by dragging its top bar. Each Palette also contains a menu that can be accessed via the small triangle at the top right.

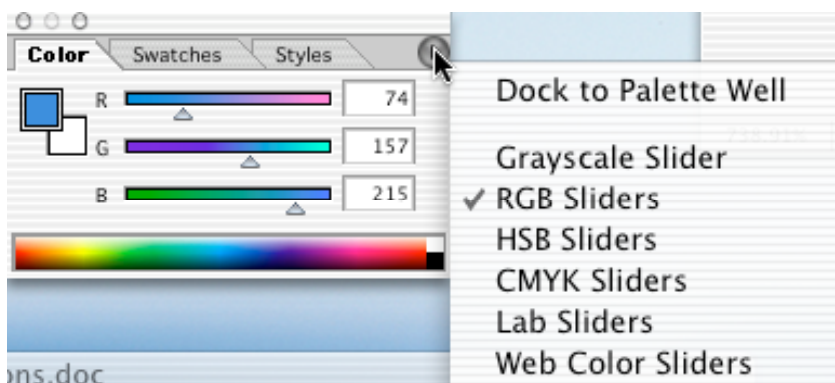


The **History Palette** keeps running tabs on user actions to any open document. A History State is simply the way a document appears at a certain moment in time. Photoshop makes it easy to go back and forth between states.

- Click on the previous history state to undo the most recent action.
- Revert to any state by clicking on it.
- All states are cleared when the document is closed!

The **Navigator Palette** allows easy access of zooming and viewing capabilities.

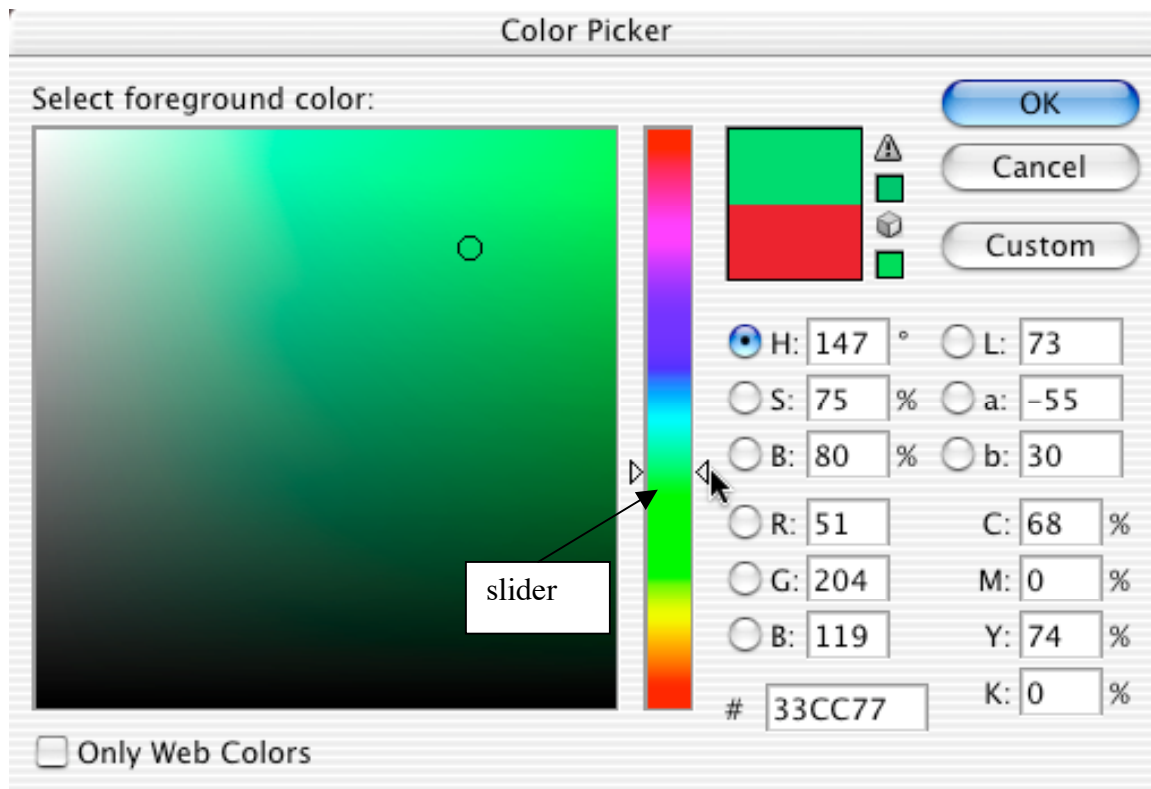
- Use the slider at the bottom of the Palette to zoom in or out of your document.
- Drag the red square on the Navigator Palette to easily move the image's editable area.



The **Color Palette** allows color selection.

- Click on the color gradient bar to choose a color.
- Use the sliders or type in values to change the Red, Blue, or Green amounts of a color.
- Use the Palette Menu for different types of color Palettes.
- Click on the Foreground or Background color to access the Color Picker.

The **Color Picker** allows more options in color selection.



- Use the Only Web Colors check box for web-safe documents.
- Drag the slider arrows to locate a color range, and click on a color to select it.
- A triangle with an exclamation point indicates that the color is out of gamut, or not a printable color.
- A cube indicates that the color is not web-safe.
- Click on the triangle or the cube to select the closest CMYK or web-safe color.
- Click OK when you have completed your selection.
